COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A comprehensive course provides a foundational understanding for working with patients, families, and staff in a healthcare setting. The pastoral student will gain a sense of calling, confidence, and competence in healthcare ministry. The sessions will be geared to practical ministry for the pastor and staff of the local church.

OBJECTIVES

1. To identify core values for healthcare ministry
2. To identify current issues and challenges in healthcare
3. To acquaint the student with the unique stresses within the crisis/grief ministry
4. To explore areas of ministry that the pastor will face in healthcare ministry
5. To provide practical information concerning chaplaincy, volunteer and professional

METHODOLOGY

This course will utilize lectures by the professor, discussion of required texts, guest professionals, and case studies. Dialogue is encouraged.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. The students are expected to attend all sessions. Punctuality is expected. Absences should be for extreme circumstances only. The limits established by the Seminary will be observed.
2. The student should read the three required texts in their entirety and prepare a two-page critique. In the critique, please state if you read the entire books and share a personal reflection on key points as applied to your ministry setting. **The critiques are due at the beginning of class.**
3. The final requirement will be a reflective paper of 7-10 pages describing how one would carry out healthcare ministry within the local church. Other topics may be addressed only with the instructor's prior approval before submitting the paper. **Final project is due: April 20, 2003.**

GRADING PROCEDURE

The course grade will be determined by evaluating class attendance and participation, book critiques, reading report, and final exam. Failure to complete assigned reading or handing assignments in late will result in a grade reduction. Late work will be accepted only if prior arrangements have been made. The completion of required work does not equal "A" quality. This element of quality will be objectively and subjectively evaluated by the instructor and will be reflected in the final grade.

20% Reading reports
70% Final paper

All assigned work for the course must be submitted for the student to receive a passing grade for the course. The grade of I (Incomplete) will be granted only for extenuating circumstances upon the written request of the student. Except in the case of severe extenuating circumstances the course grade will be reduced by one letter grade.
