COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will provide an opportunity for focused reflection on contemporary issues surrounding sexual integrity and what ministers can do to maintain integrity in their personal lives, in their ministry organizations, and among those they serve. The goal of this course is to facilitate a deeper understanding of the unique challenges facing ministers, as well as an appreciation of the potential ministry opportunities available for those desiring to take a proactive stance in addressing this critical area of concern.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

The seminar-style course is an arena for learning and growth of several kinds:

Cognitive development:

- To gain an increased awareness of the problem of ministerial/lay sexual misconduct
- To inform ministers of societal and vocational factors contributing to the problem
- To educate ministers in how to recognize and respond properly to the warning signs
- To encourage ministers how to respond appropriately when sexual misconduct occurs

Theological reflection:

- To hear contemporary culture posing critical life concerns, and to exercise reflective skills needed to begin the process of developing meaningful answers
- To consider a Biblical approach to difficult issues surrounding sexual integrity

Ministry enhancement:

- To be better prepared with the attitudes and skills necessary to proactively address sexual integrity in ministry
- To assist ministers in the prevention of impropriety in their personal lives, their ministry organizations, and among those they serve
- To equip ministers with a plethora of resources for addressing specific issues related to promoting sexual integrity in ministry.

METHODOLOGY

This course will utilize a wide variety of learning methods including guest presentations and phone interviews, video, interactive exercises, and selected reading. While the course will have a strong cognitive component, it is largely intended to be personal and reflective in nature.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

1. *Class Attendance:* Students are expect to attend all class sessions and be active participants in all interviews, discussions, activities, etc.
2. *Reading Requirement:* Read the required text in its entirety and prepare a two page typewritten "Reflective Reading Report." In this report you are to state whether or not you have completed the reading in its entirety, and discuss 3-4 of the most important ideas or challenges you picked up from the book and how they relate to your personal life and/or ministry context. (This is not a review or summary outline of the book's main points, but a personal reflection on specific insights that were significant for you personally, and why.)
Due: May 31, 2007.
3. *Final Project.* Each student will design a final project that assists them in integrating materials from the course with their personal life and/or ministry context. Final project options include:
 - *Personal growth plan:* Discuss in practical terms some of the ways the course materials can be implemented into your own life. This 8-10 page growth plan should include specific practical steps that will be taken.
 - *Ministry growth plan:* Discuss in practical terms some of the ways the course materials can be implemented into your own ministry context. This 8-10 page growth plan should include specific practical steps that will be taken.
 - *Marriage Enrichment:* Take proactive steps to enhance your marriage. This may involve attending a marriage enrichment seminar, engage in private marriage counseling, etc. Student should write an 8-10 page reflection paper on their experience.
 - *Sermons/Messages:* using insights gained from the course, write two messages designed to promote sexual integrity within the body of Christ within your ministry context.
 - *Internet Project:* research helpful resources on the Internet to assist individuals struggling with sexual temptation and prepare an 8-10 page paper on your findings.
 - *Research paper:* prepare a 10-12 page paper on some aspect of sexual integrity in ministry that would be helpful to you.
 - *Self-designed project:* Participants have the option of proposing a customized post-session project. The proposal must be submitted in written form, and the professor's permission must be secured in advance.

Final project is due: May 31, 2007.
