COURSE SYLLABUS

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the content and background of the New Testament, including the critical issues involved in the discipline of New Testament Introduction.

OBJECTIVES

At the conclusion of this course the student should:

1. Have a grasp of the historical background of the New Testament, including political realities, social structures, and religious movements and issues in both the Hellenistic-Roman and the Jewish milieus.
2. Be familiar with the basic history of NT scholarship over the last two centuries, with an end to grasping the fundamentals of modern scholarship. Such familiarity will include a working knowledge of the various methods of NT criticism, the presuppositions that gave rise to them, and their relative applicability today.
3. Be conversant in the primary introductory issues of all NT texts, understanding various points of view and being able to intelligently defend their own.
4. Realize an integration of the often highly technical information and arguments of modern NT scholarship and a living Pentecostal faith, with an end to further edify and empower the Body of Christ.

METHODOLOGY

Course objectives will be met through:

1. Classroom lecture
2. In-class questions, answers, discussions, and brief quizzes
3. Completion of required assignments of reading and writing

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

2. **Completion of reading assignments** on the indicated dates (see course plan handout).
3. **Classroom participation** (discussion, questions, answers) where appropriate.
4. **Completion of “semi-spontaneous” quizzes.** These quizzes will be announced periodically at the beginning of a given class period. At the end of said period the students will be given a question pertaining to that period’s lecture and five minutes to complete the quiz. Questions will be drawn from both lecture content and that day’s required readings. Quizzes may be somewhat comprehensive (i.e., pertaining to previous days’ lectures and/or readings).
5. **Research paper.** A 10-12 page treatment of ONE of the following:

- a. A New Testament backgrounds issue project; OR
- b. A New Testament introduction issue; OR
- c. An in-depth treatment of a chosen text.

See handout for details on all of the above. Selected themes **must** be chosen from option offered on handouts or by special permission from the professor.
