**COURSE SYLLABUS**

**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is an introduction to pastoral counseling, personality theories, therapies, helping relationships and the DSM-IV for professional counselors, chaplains and pastors. This includes reviewing essential qualities, principals, and processes of counseling in church, hospitals, para-church ministries, and mental health organizations.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES**

In keeping with the purpose of providing advanced professional and theological training, the objectives of this course are stated behaviorally in terms of learning outcomes. The goals of this course are:

1. To explain the role of counseling in pastoral or para-church ministry.
2. To begin to acquaint the student with several of the leading schools of personality theory and psychology with their therapeutic approaches.
3. To help the student begin to understand some of the differences between these approaches--in terms of the personalities behind the schools, their philosophic and psychological differences, anthropological and sociological understandings, and with reference to your personal theological correlations.
4. To help the student begin an understanding of these schools (in terms of a reasoned eclecticism or individual preference with a reasoned defense of such a preference) as correlates with the individual's own approach as a pastor or counselor.
5. To assist the student to a broader understanding of persons, as related to needs, sickness, health, wholism, life, etc.
6. To gain skills for meeting the types of counseling needs often confronted by the contemporary counselor and pastor.
7. To facilitate the student's ability to approach teachers and practitioners in these various

fields and schools in terms of teamwork, consultation and referral, as relates to community health and cooperation.

8. To recognize individual limits and make meaningful referrals when appropriate.
9. To help devise an individualized, integrated methodology for counseling or pastoral care.
10. To understand the appropriate usage of the DSM-IV and related mental health manuals.

### **METHODOLOGY**

The course will consist of class lecture and discussion led by the professor. Also, students will be involved in practice exercises dealing with actual types of pastoral counseling cases.

### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

1. Reading of designated chapters in the textbooks and supplemental reading as assigned by the instructor. A report of the completion of this reading is due **December 1, 2003**
2. Good Attitude and a positive spirit of learning and cooperation is required for this class and will make up part of your grade. Classroom attendance, punctuality and meaningful participation in discussion is required. More than three absence will be considered excessive and reduce one's grade. Three tardies constitute one absence.
3. Three written examinations will be given covering the textbooks, articles, and classrooms lectures. These examinations will consist of a combination of essay, multiple choice, and other types of questions.

### **GRADING PROCEDURE**

Grades will be assigned on the basis of successful completion of all work for the course including the reading assignments. Each exam will be of equal value.
